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PLAYWRIGHT'S NOTE



My best friend asked if his son could stay with me for a while.

Wait, let me start at the beginning.

My best friend is a super funny, cooler-thanthou, biracial-Black trans man. He has the most magnificent Afro and, like, this amazing almond brown skin. My best friend's son is also funny and cool, but his skin is as white as his other parent's.

Over the years, my best friend has struggled with addiction. It got especially bad for him when his

son turned fifteen, and he asked if I could take in the kid while he dealt with his problems. The proposal was for me to become his guardian and see him through high school. The problem was, at that time, I wore mismatched socks unintentionally and thought Pop-Tarts were healthy breakfasts. It'd been years since I'd had a homework assignment. Would I be able to make sure this kid kept a clean room if he stayed with me? What was a proper bedtime for a fifteen-year-old? How much was too much time on the phone? Would I have to scold him? Oh god, would I have to discipline him? How would I do that? Do kids still get grounded nowadays? I couldn't ground him, he was taller than me! Would I have to make dinner every night? I don't even eat dinner every night!

What if he had a question about girls? What if he had a question about war? Could I be a guardian to a teenage boy? I felt like a teenager myself.

This was the inspiration behind *Monsters of the American Cinema* -- the idea of being responsible for a teenager I didn't share blood or skin with and worrying if I would mess it up.

It never happened. The kid never came to live with me. To keep him close, my best friend asked his mother to take him in instead. It was probably for the best. I was still disappointed. Could I have been a guardian to a teenage boy? I'll never know. Maybe I would've been great. Maybe we would've been great. I'd like to think so.

Thank you so much for coming. I hope you love my boys as much as I do.

DIRECTOR'S NOTE

I read perhaps 100 plays a year.

Of those 100 only a very few, usually only 2 or 3, are worth considering for Rogue Machine. We want to produce plays that we hope help us all explore and experience what it means to be human in the times in which we live. Who are we now? How did we become so? Why? How should we live? Where are we going? And, if that isn't difficult enough, the plays we seek are character-based and entertaining. There can be significant drama, but we want to make sure there is laughter too.

Every couple of years I read a play that I immediately want us to do – it doesn't happen often. The first play I read by John Pollono - the first play I read by Sam Hunter. When I read Christian St. Croix's *Monsters of the American Cinema*, I knew I had found another must do. He doesn't just break the rules, he reinvents them. This marvelous writer tells a familiar story in a remarkable new way that has us falling in love with his characters and hoping they will find a better world for themselves and all of us.

This is very much a Heartland American journey and I can't wait to share it with our audience.

WHO'S WHO: CREATIVE TEAM

CHRISTIAN ST. CROIX (Playwright)

Christian St. Croix is a playwright living and working in San Diego, CA. The San Diego Union-Tribune has called him "one of the nation's fastest-rising playwrights, thanks to his ability to write multidimensional characters with wry humor and truth, as well as unique stories told from his perspective as a queer Black writer." His plays include *Monsters of the American Cinema*, winner of the 2021 Carlo Annoni International Drama Award, *We Are the Forgotten Beasts*, a 2022 Eugene O'Neill National Playwrights Conference Finalist, and *ZACH*, winner of the 2021 Young-Howze Theatre Award for Best Comedic Writing.

JOHN PERRIN FLYNN (Director, Founding Artistic Director)

John is Rogue Machine's founding Artistic Director. For RMT, he has directed World Premieres of John Pollono's Lost Girls and Henry Murray's Treefall; Enda Walsh's The New Electric Ballroom and Penelope; Samuel D. Hunter's Pocatello, A Permanent Image and A Bright New Boise; The Sunset Limited; Oppenheimer; and our inaugural production, Compleat Female Stage Beauty. John was the Executive Producer and Director of Lifetime's long-running series Strong Medicine and has produced two other series and 14 television movies or miniseries including the Emmy-nominated Burden of Proof. In 2012, he received the Career Achievement Award for Theatre from the LA Weekly. John is a proud member of the Chickasaw Nation.

GUILLERMO CIENFUEGOS (Artistic Director)

Guillermo Cienfuegos serves as Artistic Director at Rogue Machine, along with Founding Artistic Director John Perrin Flynn. He directed the Rogue Machine productions of Heroes of the Fourth Turning, The Beautiful People, Disposable Necessities, Ready Steady Yeti Go and Dutch Masters, as well as the RMT video productions of Insulted: Belarus(sia) and Voices of the New Belarus. Cienfuegos won both the Ovation and Los Angeles Drama Critics Circle Awards for Best Director for his production of Shakespeare's Henry V at Pacific Resident Theatre. He has directed numerous productions at PRT, including Ionesco's Rhinoceros, Pinter's The Homecoming and Safe at Home: An Evening with Orson Bean. Other theatre directing credits include Julia, both at PRT and at New York's 59E59 theatre, Off-Broadway, the World Premiere of Middle of the World at Boise Contemporary Theatre, Christmas Contigo at Oregon Cabaret Theatre, the Los Angeles Premiere of Stephen Adly Guirgis' Pulitzer Prize winner Between Riverside and Crazy at the Fountain Theatre and most recently Shakespeare's Much Ado About Nothing at A Noise Within. Guillermo Cienfuegos is the directing pseudonym of actor Alex Fernandez, who has appeared at numerous regional theatres, including the American Conservatory Theatre, Alaska Rep and the Old Globe, as well as in dozens of local productions most notably Henry V, The Cherry Orchard and Rhinoceros at PRT, Exiles at the Hayworth and Luka's Room at Rogue Machine. Fernandez has over 170 film and television credits, most recently recurring on the series American Gigolo, Mayans MC and Good Trouble. Cienfuegos was featured in the 'People to Watch' issue of American Theatre magazine and is a graduate of the American Conservatory Theatre.

LEXI SLOAN (Producer)

Lexi is honored that her producorial debut with RMT is *Monsters of the American Cinema.* Diving into complex and meaningful storytelling is what drew her to the company. Currently a Creative Producer at Apple, she also pursues film and theatre acting. When not in LA, she indulges her passion for travel and ice cream. Her credits range from professional theatre to films and TV shows. This is Christine's first show as the official resident costume designer at Rogue Machine. Other local credits include Unbound Production's Wicked Lit series, for which she won an Ovation in 2017, and the world premiere of John Ross Bowie's *Brushstroke.* Recent television credits include assistant costume design on *Cosmos: Possible Worlds* for NatGeo and *Promised Land* for ABC.

MICHELLE HANZELOVA-BIERBAUER (Graphic Design/Projections Design)

Michelle is a graphics and video projection designer. Most recently she designed projections for Tim Venable's *The Beautiful People* and Mike Bartlett's *Earthquakes in London* at Rogue Machine (Ovation Nomination). She's designed poster graphics for Rogue Machine, PRT, Theatre of Note, Lobby Theatre, Sacred Fools, International City Theatre and others. ROGI prs tasters TIMES CHANGE. TYRANTS AND TEENAGERS DON'T.

COMING UP AT ROGUE MACHINE ON OUR HENRY MURRAY STAGE

Hitler's Tasters is a fictional retelling of a largely unknown story of the German young women conscripted to taste Adolf Hitler's food for poison. This dark comedy explores the way girls navigate sexuality, friendship, and patriotism during the Third Reich. Using an anachronistic retelling of a historical footnote, Hitler's Tasters considers what girls discuss as they wait to see if they will survive another meal.

Hitler's Tasters was inspired by a 2014 interview with 94-year-old Margot Wölk who, for the first time, revealed her harrowing past as one of Adolf Hitler's food tasters. Margot, a German secretary at the time, was among fifteen young women selected for this "honor" at Hitler's Wolf's Lair.
